FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Churches in liminal time.

On Saturday, June 18, on my way back home from the 240th session of the Virginia Annual Conference in Hampton, I was pondering what new ideas I wanted to bring back with me to the Bethany congregation.

Of the many things I experienced at Annual Conference, I thought the Bible study on Saturday morning was the best for me in that it gave me a fresh insight about where we are as United Methodists, where we are called to go.

The Rev. Lisa Greenwood, from the North Texas Annual Conference, taught the Bible study based on Acts 1:8, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Rev. Greenwood diagnosed the current life of the United Methodist Church. Along with the global issue of the COVID-19 pandemic, our denomination has been dealing with many issues and agendas from theological, cultural and political viewpoints – a divisive issue regarding human sexuality, ordination of LGBTQ+ individuals, the postponed General Conference now scheduled for 2024, the beginning of the Global Methodist Church, and new systems to make us proactive to change occurring inside and outside of our denomination. Rev. Greenwood named it a liminal time, not knowing where we are going while dealing with changes. And I agreed with her. A liminal time is for us to reflect on things happening around us, and to discern our call from God.

Rev. Greenwood opened the Bible to find our hope from God, teaching what had happened in the first century church in Jerusalem, which was also in a time of uncertainty and change, and how they responded to God's leading, to the work of the Holy Spirit. God was doing a new thing. That is what we learn today during our liminal time.

Rev. Greenwood likened our changing landscape in the church to an ecosystem, a complex interconnected community in which organisms emerge, grow, and mutate, and for a time the old and new co-exist. Gradually, the original organism struggles to survive in the new ecosystem. Our United Methodist boards and systems are designed around an old ecosystem. We are struggling, but we can adapt and embrace biodiversity, in the form of fresh expressions and ways of reaching out to people, which is important for healthy ecosystems.

What does it look like for the church to be witnesses in this emerging landscape, for this season? Rev. Greenwood described five "adaptive muscles" that are necessary for churches to exercise in order to remain effective in witness:

1. Grieving well—Name the grief that comes with change. Until we do, we can't see the new thing that God is doing and can't be used by God.

2. Discerning Purpose—What is God doing among us? Where is the Holy Spirit at work?

3. Walking Alongside—What is God already doing in our neighborhood? How is God calling us to join in?

4. Distributing Power—De-centralize power and distribute it. Old power is like "currency" that is accumulated and held by a few; new power is like electric "current" which reaches all. We are all given the power of the Holy Spirit, to use in ministry.

5. Expanding Imagination—Take what we already know and use it to learn something new. We become stuck on a treadmill of trying the same things that used to work, trying harder and harder. God is pointing us to innovation and imagination, to trying new ways of reaching others.

Since John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist faith movement in 18th century England, we have kept four theological criteria that have made us to stand firm against issues:

Scripture — the primary source and criterion for Christian doctrine.

Tradition — the shared history of Christianity with Scripture as the focal expression of the tradition.

Experience — the examining experience, both individual and corporate, confirming God's grace and love attested in Scripture. Our experience interacts with Scripture. Reason — By reason, we read and interpret Scripture, determine if our witness is clear, ask questions of faith, and seek to understand.

Our Bishop and Cabinet reappointed me back to Bethany for the coming year, and I am glad that I get to continue serving Bethany church, building up the church together with you, growing in faith with you, and working together with you for the work of God by the power of the Holy Spirit.

"It is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose" (Philippians 2:13, NIV).

LAY DELEGATE REPORT FROM ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Last month I saw God and people working together at the 240th Session of the Virginia United Methodist Conference in Hampton, Virginia. The Annual Conference brings together clergy delegates from 1200 churches and an equal number of laity elected by their congregations and districts. The purpose is to worship together and feel God's nearness and desires, to learn what various ministries are doing and accomplishing, to vote on motions, and to hear the state of the church.

In the laity session Martha Stokes, the conference lay leader, briefly listed duties of lay delegates, then introduced a speaker with a message. She reminded us that Methodism began as a laity movement and grew rapidly. Then she urged us to change our methods to meet people in the communities where they are. There are two reasons why that is a necessity: it is a mission given to us by God – to make disciples for transformation of the world, and, secondly, for the survival of our churches.

Bishop Sharma D. Lewis called the session to order Thursday afternoon, June 16th. This was followed by welcoming, Martha Stokes' laity address to the assembled delegates, and reports. Friday morning began with lively singing and Bible study. Rev. Lisa Greenwood focused on Acts, Chapter 1, when the apostles faced an uncertain time and they needed to make decisions about what to do next; then she said we also are in a time that requires decision-making.

At present there are in the Virginia Conference eight district superintendents for sixteen districts; each DS became responsible for two districts. This year a proposal to organize into eight districts was presented and debated. Debate consisted of several delegates speaking for or against the proposal to the whole body assembled; when the body voted, the proposal passed. This action envisions adding personnel to district staffs to provide additional assistance to congregations. This action also will allow two district committees to be combined into one, making use of committee members' knowledge of communities the committee serves. Costs to the districts for added personnel will be supplemented by grants from the Virginia Conference for three years.

The presence of God showed in presentations of different ministries meeting a host of needs in our communities and in our world. In service to others, 18,560 kits and around 12,000 pounds of food were donated. A mission worship service reminded us that mission requires relationship-building as demonstrated in Mark 2:1-12 where a paralytic man needed four or more friends to carry him to the house where Jesus was, break through the roof, and lower him to Jesus. Annual Conference is a learning experience, a worshipful experience, a time to greet old friends and make new ones. Thank you for letting me represent you. Many parts of this conference were recorded and can be viewed at the Conference website, vaumc.org. Next year Annual Conference will be in Roanoke, followed by Hampton in 2024.
